

In New York State various county associations were organized at an early period. In 1831 a State Convention of Teachers and Friends of Education was held at Utica, January 12th, 13th, and 14th. This convention was the earliest State organization of teachers of which we have found any record. The following were the officers of the convention: Rev. Dr. Davis, of Hamilton College, President; Messrs. S. W. Taylor and Henry Howe, Vice-Presidents; Professor Yates and Mr. E. Wilson, Secretaries. Delegates were present from twenty-two counties. At this convention resolutions were passed favoring the establishment of departments to qualify teachers; abolishing the office of town inspectors and substituting county inspectors; recommending the Monitorial System, with some restrictions and modifications and the speedy formation of town and county lyceums. A resolution calling a national convention, which resulted in the establishment of the...
